



## Reflection on the music of Easter-Song of the Open Road

The drama of the Easter story unfolds on two stages- the resurrection of the Cosmic Christ, the awesome, terrifying power of an Omnipotent God capable of overcoming, and ultimately destroying the power of death. On the earthly plane we encounter the very personal stories; Jesus in the garden with Mary, appearing in the midst of the disciples locked in an upper room, and having a breakfast of roasted fish with Peter on the beach. In the end, what does the resurrection story mean to us?

At first blush Walt Whitman's *Song of the Open Road* might seem to be a strange, even irreverent, choice of text to be sung on Easter morning. After all, Whitman, one of the greatest poets of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, was an American secular humanist who might well be mortified that his poem is being lifted up in a Christian ritual. Thankfully Easter is a holiday wrapped in the most supreme surprise...And we happen to worship at Christ Church where the people of God always seem willing to express and experience our faith in fresh and, at times, startling ways.

The opening sentences of our Sunday worship services concisely point to the essence of Whitman's poem:

Whoever you are and where ever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here.

The 'Song of the Open Road' is an invitation to join the traveler on the journey. "Follow me!" might be a two word summary of this epic poem. We are asked to leave behind the daily tasks and mundane work that keeps us from experiencing the fullness of life characterized by the open road. We also read that when we enter the road and the mystery that it contains:

You road I enter upon and look around
I believe you are not all that is here
I believe that much unseen is also here.
Once we are on the road we make the discovery of our own worth;

I did not know I held so much goodness.

The poem doesn't concern itself with reflection so much as action. We must make the choice to be on the road- we are continually urged on *Allons!* (*Let's go!*). Being on the road is an experience that requires us to live differently than before. You shall not heap up what is called riches You shall scatter with lavish hand all that you earn or achieve Listen! I will be honest with you I do not offer the old smooth prizes But offer rough new prizes.

We are warned not be caught up in the daily routines that have numbed us to the deeper reality of the open road. Let the tools remain in the workshop Let the money remain unearned Let the school stand, mind not the cry of the teacher Let the teacher teach, let the lawyer plead, let the judge expound the law.

As the music rushes to it's inevitable climax the poem gives the ultimate invitation:

Comrado, I give you my hand! I give you my love, more precious than money!

As the final strains of the music come to a close, we are asked the questions:

Will you give me yourself? Will you come travel with me? Shall we stick by each other as long as we live?

Easter resurrection is not a time of reflection, it is a time to experience and to act. The meaning of Easter comes to me through this poem in two ways. Whitman's central theme "I did not know I held so much goodness" is the truth of what Jesus preached when he said "the kin-dom of God is within you." Through Easter we are confronted by our own goodness- that we are not only redeemable, but we made of love- the love that comes from God and is at the heart of the universe and will not be stopped by death, fear, hopelessness and despair.

And perhaps even more unbelievable, this Universal, Ultimate Cosmic force is asking us to be in relationship, to get onto the open road to come and as Jesus says time and again, 'follow me'. We are asked to love and mend the world, to do justice and love kindness and walk humbly with God. In the end the omnipotent God makes a very vulnerable request to each one of us:

Will you give me yourself?
Will you come travel with me?
Shall we stick by each other as long as we live?
